

## What are California Ballot Propositions?

**Propositions** are: Proposed Laws placed on the Ballot that Require Voter Approval

#### Placed on the ballot

- With enough voter signatures
- By the state legislature

Require 50%+1 "YES" Vote to become law

- Change current law
- Create new laws
- Amend the State Constitution



## When do we have a Special Election?

Special Elections: Occur when a vote is needed before the next

scheduled primary or legislative term election.

November 4th California Special Election contains the single ballot measure, Proposition 50, an amendment to our current California Constitution that will remain in effect through 2030.





## CALIFORNIA CITIZENS REDISTRICTING COMMISSION (CRC) NON-PARTISAN RULES

To prevent "gerrymandering", the California Citizens Redistricting Commission must follow certain rules. 5 registered Democrats
 7 registered Republicans
 8 not with either party

Public input required to factor in

Common interests
Neighborhoods
Communities

Maps may not favor candidates or political parties



### Why does Proposition 50 Require a Special Election?

- Proposition 50 requires temporary use of congressional maps drawn by the California Legislature.
- Amends the state constitution and overrides a voter-approved duty of the Citizens Redistricting Commission (Proposition 20 passed in 2010).
- Amendments to the California Constitution must be approved by the voters.




Proposition 50 was placed on the ballot in response to newly redistricted congressional maps drawn in Texas and similar redistricting proposals called for by legislatures in other states.


#### YOLO COUNTY'S CURRENT CONGRESSIONAL DISTRICTS



#### 2 Congressional districts:

Most of Yolo County is in the 4<sup>th</sup> congressional district, currently represented by Mike Thompson (CA-04).

West Sacramento and rural areas south are in the 7<sup>th</sup> congressional district currently represented by Doris Matsui (CA-07).



#### YOLO COUNTY'S PROPOSED CONGRESSIONAL DISTRICTS




#### 3 Congressional districts:

Most of Yolo County would still be in the 4<sup>th</sup> congressional district, currently represented by Mike Thompson (CA-04).

West Sacramento would be in the 6<sup>th</sup> congressional district, currently represented by Ami Bera (CA-06).

The portion of the southern part of Yolo County, including Davis south of I-80, would be in the 8th Congressional district, currently represented by John Garamendi (CA-08).



### **Proposition 50 – Estimated Costs**



Statewide, changing the existing maps would increase counties' costs to update their election materials.

It would cost the state itself about \$200,000. For the state, that's less than one-tenth of one percent of its \$220 billion budget.



### **Arguments For Proposition 50**










- Prop 50 is a short-term, temporary emergency plan needed to stop President Trump's attempt to unfairly rig next year's congressional election.

### **Financial Support for Proposition 50**

As of **October 13**, **2025**, there have been over 147,000 contributions in support of Proposition 50, with over \$143 million being raised according to the California Secretary of State. The top 10 contributors are listed here:



minority voices in elections














- Prop 50 is a power grab by politicians that undoes fair election reforms and returns California to gerrymandered districts that benefit politicians over voters.
- Prop 50 replaces an open public process with secretive political backroom deals.
- Prop 50 hurts fair representation by dividing neighborhoods and weakening minority voices in elections.
- Prop 50 lets politicians control district lines for years and could open the door to permanent, not temporary, control.
- Prop 50 costs taxpayers \$200 million when the state is cutting funding to important programs because of budget problems.

### **Arguments Against Proposition 50**



#### ARGUMENTS

Prop. 50 was written by politicians, for politicians dismantling safeguards that keep elections fair, removes requirements to keep local communities together, and eliminates voter protections that ban maps designed to favor political parties. Vote NO to protect fair elections and keep citizens—not politicians—in charge of redistricting.

### Financial Opposition to Proposition 50

As of **October 13, 2025**, there have been 268 contributions in opposition to Proposition 50. Over \$83.8 million has been raised according to the California Secretary of State. The top 10 contributors are listed here:

# VOTING INFORMATION Registering to Vote

# The last day to register online is October 20 to vote in the November 4 Election

Website: https://registertovote.ca.gov

- Check your address is up to date at <a href="https://registertovote.ca.gov">https://registertovote.ca.gov</a>
- **Update your registration information** by October 28, to receive a mail-in-ballot before the election.
- Il voters should go to the Secretary of State to check their address is up to date (the link is in the Easy Voter Guide).
- MAIL-IN BALLOTS ARE NEVER FORWARDED TO A NEW ADDRESS.
- If you are registered to vote and have **not yet received your ballot**, contact the Yolo County Elections Office as soon as possible. **625 Court St. Woodland** <u>530-666-8133</u>



# VOTING INFORMATION Registering to Vote

Voters may ALSO register same-day at an in-person Voting Center and receive a provisional ballot up to 8pm on November 4th.



# VOTING INFORMATION Returning Mail Ballots in the U.S. Mail

Vote-by-Mail Ballots began going out in Yolo County on October 6th.

Registered Voters who did not receive a mail ballot should contact the Yolo County Elections office at 625 Court St. Woodland or by phone at 530-666-8133.

A completed ballot may be dropped in any U.S. mailbox with a collection time before 8pm on November 4<sup>th</sup>. Check the collection time on the mailbox to be sure your ballot will be picked up on time!

No Stamp is needed.

Voters MUST SIGN the outside of the ballot envelope for their vote to be counted.



# VOTING INFORMATION Returning Mail Ballots in Ballot Drop Boxes

A completed ballot may also be <u>dropped off at any Ballot Drop Box or in-person Voting Center</u> before 8pm on November 4th.

Ballot Drop Boxes\_in Yolo County are available October 6 - November 4

There are **8 OUTDOOR** drop boxes in Yolo County located at:

- Clarksburg Library
- Davis: UCD Campus and Davis City Hall
- Esparto Library
- Knights Landing Library
- West Sacramento City Hall
- Woodland: Woodland Community College Campus and Woodland Post Office

There are also **SEVEN** businesses in Davis, West Sacramento, Winters and Woodland with drop boxes available **INDOORS** during store hours **October 6 - November 4 (8 p.m.)** 

ALL Drop Box locations are listed in the Yolo County Election Office Voting Guide mailed to voters.



# VOTING INFORMATION Voting Centers in Yolo County

The November 4th Special Election will only have **SIX In-Person Early Voting Centers**:

Davis, Woodland and West Sacramento in-person centers will open October 25.

A second center on the UC Davis Campus and a center in Winters will open on **November 1st.** 

The UC Davis Campus will open an additional center on ELECTION DAY ONLY, **November 4th** in the **ARC Ball Room**.

All Vote Centers are open 10:00 a.m. – 6:00 p.m. through November 3.
